A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

THANK YOU: To the residents (especially kids) and businesses, for your patience and understanding through the recent construction that is abuzz in Westwood. The new Walmart Neighborhood Market is well under way. It's messy, but they are diligently working to get the store opened and they think they can get it done ahead of the scheduled January opening. It will be the envy of stores in the area and provide great service to the residents. The Woodside pools – are they really open? Yes, better late than never. Three snow storms and spring showers delayed contractors, but the pools are open and they look great. There's lots of new landscaping, new furniture and poolside food & beverage service. Please check out the pools if you haven't already.

Joe D. Dennis Park: Our City Park has remained relatively unchanged since 1974. For years, it has served as the best space for community affairs such as Oktoberfest, July 4th parties, Movies in the Park, the Easter Egg Hunt and so much more. However, it has not been updated to be Americans with Disabilities ACT (ADA) compliant. The tennis court, once thought to serve dual purpose as an Ice skating rink continues to be damaged by storm water run-off. The fountain is dated by technology standards and becomes more difficult and expensive to maintenance each year. The City has engaged the services of Indigo Consulting (http://indigoparks.com/) to review possibilities about upgrading our City Park. It is very early in the process and there will be more communications on this in the near future.

City Comprehensive Plan: Any plans such as a Park improvement will need to be consistent with our Comprehensive Plan, which was authored in 1997. It is one of the goals of your elected officials to update this plan. There will be ample opportunity for citizen input with visioning sessions and public meetings. Soon work will begin for future planning that will include critical discussions for infrastructure, diversified revenues, overlay district planning and cooperative work with the Shawnee Mission School District. We also intend to have integrated conversations with the Westwood Foundation since objectives will likely be aligned.

Westwood Hills applies for Historic District: You may have heard recently that Westwood Hills has made application to the Kansas State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) to designate the entire City as an historic

district. This unprecedented move did have possible consequences for Westwood properties. Properties in Westwood and Mission Woods would have had to seek approval in Topeka for projects requiring a permit. However, during the last legislative session, language removing the 500 foot review requirement was stripped. If the bill is signed, the 500-foot historic environs review is dead, according to SHPO. This should put all Westwood adjacent property owners' minds at ease about making improvements or changes to their properties.

Taco Republic: The new restaurant on the KCK corner of 47th St. & Mission Road is under way as new development within the 47th & Mission Road Overlay District continues. They have a taco truck on the site during the weekend selling sample tacos. Try them!

Woodside Village Phase I: In order to demo the YouthFront property, cell towers must be removed from the roof which are active and under contract with mobile providers. Temporary tower plans have been approved and amendments to the Woodside lease have been passed enabling temporary towers to be erected on the South side of Woodside. Phase I demolitions are planned for the latter part of summer. Watch for more updates.

Midwest Transplant Network: MTW, one of Westwood's largest employers with over 100 full time employees, has submitted plans to update their building and expand at State Line Road and 47th Place.

2014 Budget: Budget planning for next year is under way. Budgets are due to the County in August and your council anticipates having it complete by end of July's Council meeting.

Congratulations: Councilman Matt Jones and his wife Jill welcomed their son Cooper on Friday, June 21st. Planning Commission Member Justin Bridges and his wife Mindy welcomed their daughter Ainsley on Saturday, June 22nd. Congratulations to the Jones & Bridges families!

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KEEPING WESTWOOD SAFE & BEAUTIFUL

The City of Westwood issues building permits for many items around your house that you may not be aware of such as water heaters, furnaces, air conditioning units, gas line replacements, fences, sheds, decks, and driveways. There are two primary reasons for requiring building permits. The first is to ensure the product being installed conforms with the life safety regulations adopted. The second is local provisions that make our community a great place to live. Our permit fees are some of the lowest in the area, which is intended to prevent residents from avoiding the building permit process and to encourage reinvestment of your property.

Please remember that your grass height should be maintained at a maximum height of eight inches. While we understand it can be difficult to address due to the frequent rains and busy summer schedule, it is important to stay on top of your mowing to prevent grass from becoming too tall and unsightly.

While our community is one to be very proud of, homeowners should be mindful of the state of their property. Keeping your roof in good shape, the fence from leaning or missing boards, and the paint on your dwelling from peeling or fading is paramount to ensuring each street keeps its value and livability. Our staff is not out daily checking on which property is in need of a new coat of paint, but rather we are here to help you understand the home improvement process and when a residence is found to be lacking in basic property maintenance we try and work to resolve the matter.

Westwood Building Updates

The former Apple Market site is fully under construction and soon will be a WalMart Neighborhood Market.
The changes have been impressive as the general contractor is virtually re-building the entire store. To date the general contractor has replaced the roof, set new equipment, constructed the addition, poured a new concrete slab for a new floor inside the building, installed a new electric service and replaced all the interior plumbing and has started on the exterior walls and new fence that surrounds the site. Activity through August will consist of completing the exterior walls, working on completing the parking lot with entrances to the site, and finishing the interior portions of the building so new shelving and refrigeration units can be installed.

The Woodside Pool renovation project is almost complete. While the pool complex is open, there are still some smaller items yet to be completed. Patrons will notice at some point soon landscaping being installed in the planter boxes around the entire perimeter of the complex. The second floor deck in the pool house is

almost complete and once it is approved then access to the deck and second floor pool house room will be ready for all to enjoy. This will also include access to the outdoor shower below the deck. Also, on the lower main pool deck the outdoor grille is almost complete. A new feature for the kids will be a splash pad with in-slab bubblers. Many of the mechanical items that make the entire pool complex function were renovated or replaced, making the site a much safer and efficient place to enjoy the summer months.

The KU Med Building along Shawnee Mission Parkway is also experiencing construction activity. Newly completed inside is an office and patient area allowing personal contact with staff on pharmaceutical issues. Later this summer the 3rd floor will be under renovation for more patient and office space upgrades not seen since the building formally housed the Sprint operations. Most of the renovation are being torn down to the bare concrete and steel and being rebuilt back to finished offices. KU has made a significant investment in their facilities at this location.

UNIVERSIAL STORMWATER FEE EXPLAINED

For years your City Council has been discussing the implementation of a storm water fee for all Westwood properties. Storm water is water from natural precipitation. As rain or snow falls it is either absorbed into the ground or runs downhill and dissipates. Impervious surfaces, such as rooftops and pavement, prevent water from absorbing into the ground and causes runoff. Unmanaged storm water runoff can cause flooding and threatens public health and safety. Storm water can carry contaminants and pollutants. The City of Westwood has storm water infrastructure to manage runoff, but the pipes and structures are aging and will be in need repair or replacement in the near future.

During its May 9th meeting, the City Council was presented with a plan to implement a storm water fee. This fee will be assessed on property tax bills, much like trash services. Property owners will be assessed an amount for every 500-square feet of impervious surface on a property which includes all buildings and accessory structures, patios, athletic courts, swimming pools and any paved or hard surface driveways and parking lots located thereon within the City's limits. The amount assessed will be evaluated and determined as part of the city's FY 2014 budget approval process. It is anticipated that the annual amount assessed will be about \$60 on the average residence in Westwood.

A storm water fee will spread the costs of maintaining the City's infrastructure across all entities and properties in the city. A storm water management service fee is not a tax; as such the new fee would spread the payment across all properties in the city – even those that are tax exempt.

The City's annual leaf-pick up program contributes to the management of the city's storm water system. In past years, maintenance of the city's drains, storm sewer system and the leaf pick-up program was paid out of the city's general fund; primarily from property and sales taxes. Since the general fund pays for a wide variety of services, the storm sewer system often did not receive the necessary funds to make the needed improvements and maintenance. Many cities have created storm water utilities to maintain and repair existing storm system components (storm sewer pipes, inlets and valves, canals and channels, ditches, curb drainage, etc.) and to fund costs associated with compliance with the Federal Clean Water Act.
