Friends and Neighbors,



The stripes are a relatively low cost traffic calming measure that intend to slow traffic as well as put more space between pedestrians on the sidewalk and moving vehicles. With the previous configuration of the road, a vehicle driver would perceive that they had roughly 23 feet of road between the edge of the gutters. Several spots on Belinder have

much space, the tendency is to drive fast. Before the addition of the stripes, a speed trailer monitored over 29,500 vehicles traveling both directions on Belinder Ave., a 25mph zone. Out of those vehicles, 17.5% were traveling at 30mph or greater and 2.3% traveling at 35mph or greater. The stripes give the perception of less space per lane and when there is less space, the tendency of vehicle drivers is to slow down. This effort supports community multimodal goals and objectives as outlined in the Westwood Comprehensive Plan and is supported by several policies in the Framework Plan.

5050 RAINBOW DEMOLITION WORK

At its July 9, 2020 regular meeting, the City Council voted to accept the bid of Midwest Wrecking for the demolition of the former Westwood Christian Church building and parking lot at 5050 Rainbow Blvd, which the City has owned since 2014, and for which work the City Council budgeted in 2020. This action supports the City's commitment to the goals and objectives laid out in the 2017 Westwood Comprehensive Plan for the site as a key factor in the construction of a new Westwood View facility and/or expanded public spaces for community use and benefit. The City's Comprehensive Plan

The demolition contractor is in the midst of the demolition work, with the majority of heavy demolition having occurred Tuesday, August 11th.

Timeline

7/27 - 8/10: Light, preliminary demolition; environmental remediation work; and salvage of the cornerstone, archway, and facade stone; minor, if any, noise and disruptions to neighbors

8/11 - 8/14: Heavy, major demolition work; loud equipment noise expected between the hours of 8 AM - 5 PM, only

8/17 - 9/25: Light to moderate demolition and removal work, minor, if any, noise and disruptions to neighbors Late October: Space anticipated to be ready to accommodate open space play and use by neighbors (subject to status of grass growth following seeding by contractor)

BMP COST SHARE PROGRAM

The City of Westwood encourages individual homeowners and businesses to incorporate Stormwater Best Management Practices (BMP) on their property to aid in the improvement of local and regional water quality.

At the same time, the city encourages planting native plants and trees to support the natural ecosystem and provide food for pollinators like bees and butterflies. The BMP Cost Share program will reimburse applicants up to 50% of eligible expenses, not to exceed a project reimbursement cap for the proper installation of the following best management practices:

Project	Reimbursement
Rain Barrel	\$75/barrel, up to two (2)
Native Tree Planting	150/tree, up to two (2)
Rain Garden/Pollinator Garden	\$1,000

COMPLETE STREETS STRIPING PROJECT

For the past 30+ years, Westwood has been working with Roeland Park, the Unified Government of Wyandotte County - Kansas City, Kansas, and other partners to plan improvements to 47th St between Rainbow Blvd. and Mission Rd. to make the corridor safer and more inviting, as well as to implement other strategies to support existing and future businesses.

This collaboration has resulted in the recommendation of reducing the current four-lane road to a three-lane road and adding bike lanes and pedestrian crosswalks to the corridor. In 2020, these improvements will be striped and minor signal and signage improvements will be made prior to full road reconstruction to make these improvements permanent in 2022.

The road work and lane conversion will take place from August 17 through September 15. At least one lane of traffic each way will be open for vehicles and buses throughout the roadwork and minimal pedestrian disruptions are anticipated. Businesses and residents along the corridor will maintain access to their properties and drives throughout the project and will be notified prior to work commencing adjacent to their properties.

SUSPICIOUS SEED WARNING

As you may be aware, there has been a large number of people across the country receiving packages of seeds shipped from outside the US that they have not been requested. There is concern of potential harm to the US agriculture if the seeds contain materials that are harmful to agriculture production. The Kansas Department of Agriculture asked Kansas law enforcement to make others aware of this situation.

The Kansas Department of Agriculture has posted a page on their website which will be maintained with upto-date information at

https://agriculture.ks.gov/divisions-programs/plantprotect-weed-control/seed

On that page will be warnings to not plant the seeds and information related to improper disposal, which could result in the seeds unintentionally germinating. It also has specific instructions on how to ship the seeds to the proper authorities for investigation and asks that KDA be notified if the seeds have already been planted.
