A MESSAGE FROM YOUR POLICE DEPARTMENT

With the warm weather, it has been a pleasure to see an increased number of people using our park. We wanted to take a moment to remind everyone of the Park Rules so everyone can have a safe and enjoyable time.

The park amenities are available on a first come, first served basis. When using the park, please follow these guidelines:

- Tennis court time limits are 45 minutes for singles ment. Auto burglars sometimes frequent and 60 minutes for doubles
- Bicycles or skateboards are not allowed inside the parks or public grounds
- Alcoholic liquor or cereal malt beverages are not allowed inside the park
- Please refrain from swimming or wading in the park
- All trash, bottles, or debris should be placed in trash containers

- Excessive noise will not be tolerated, especially in the evening hours that may disturb neighboring resi-
- Please refrain from climbing the park's trees

Always be alert. Criminals can be park users, too.

Burglars sometimes use parks to prey on those who are using the park legitimately. Remember to lock your car and do not leave valuables in the passenger compart-

If you see anyone who makes you feel uncomfortable, trust your instincts, and go the other way. Report anything you suspicious to is the police
