SNOW REMOVAL PROCEDURES IN WESTWOOD

when there is a light accumulation of snow.

With an accumulation of about 2" of snow, Westwood Public Works staff begins plowing, concentrating on the primary routes until the snow fall has stopped or the accumulation reaches

If snow has reached 6" and is still falling, staff will plow two passes down each secondary route. Once the snow

has ended, the primary routes are plowed once more before the secondary routes are plowed at full width. At that time Westwood Public Works staff will treat the streets with de-icing or traction materials as needed.

Primary routes are:

- Belinder Road
- Mission Road
- Rainbow Boulevard
- State Line Road
- 47th Place
- 47th Street
- 50th Street
- 51st Terrace

All other streets are defined as secondary routes.

A salt mixture is applied to the primary routes, hills, With winter upon us, our crews have inspected vehicles curves, and approximately 60 feet from intersections and are ready for plowing. The City of Westwood snowplow drivers are trained professionals. These driv-

ers are hardworking, safe, and reliable. They strive to keep your streets clear and traversable.

Many of Westwood's streets are residential and can be somewhat narrow. Parking along city streets makes plowing efforts difficult. Our drivers occasionally run into problems with on street parking. Because of this, I would like to take the time to remind

you that Westwood has an overnight parking ordinance which restricts parking to two hours on the streets between 12am and 6am. Additionally, we ask that during snow events you be cognizant of things such as trash cans, recycle carts, basketball goals, etc. placed in the street rather than curbside or at the end of residential driveways. Our drivers always stive to plow as close to the curb as possible but if parked cars or other objects are in the street, they must drive around them to avoid damage.

Additionally, for those with parking permits, when snow accumulation of two or more inches is expected, we ask you to try to park your vehicles in your driveway.



Once the Shawnee Mission School District released news in the Fall of 2020 that Westwood View would be rebuilt in Westwood on the site of the former Entercom radio station, and after it won approval from the Gov-

2023 CITY ISSUED LICENSES

All owners of pets, businesses, residential rental property, those who rent out rooms in their home, and massage therapists are required by City Ordinances to apply for a license on a yearly basis. On January 15, 2023 all licenses issued by the City during 2022 will expire. All renewal forms are available online. If you have any questions about any of these licenses contact Abby Schnecalling 913.942.2127 weis by by.schneweis@westwoodks.org.

Pets: Dogs and cats over three months of age are required to be licensed on a yearly basis in Westwood. Each Westwood household is permitted to keep up to three dogs, cats or any combination of both animals. Upon receipt of your pet license application, your pet's tag(s) will be mailed to you along with your paid receipt. The fee is \$5.00 for spayed/neutered dogs and cats and \$10.00/each for unaltered dogs and cats. There is no charge to senior citizen pet owners age 60 and over. Businesses: Fees for business licenses vary depending on the nature of service the business is providing as well as the square footage of the business. A fee table is included on the renewal application. Business license applications can be found at the URL below.

Rental Properties: Rental license fees are \$30 per property. In addition to licensure, rental properties are subject to an annual code inspection by Westwood's Building Official. WESTWOOD EARNS BRONZE LEVEL RECOGNITION FROM THE COMMUNITIES FOR ALL AGES PROGRAM

Earlier this year, Mayor David Waters, Council President Jeff Harris, and City Administrator Leslie Herring took the lead in partnering with the Mid-America Regional Council (MARC) for Westwood to be recognized as a Community For All Ages. The Communities For All Ages program is comprised of three levels of recognition – Bronze, Silver, and Gold. The Bronze level represents a community's awareness, Silver a community's assessment, and Gold a community's implementation or action.

A Community For All Ages seeks to meet the needs and interests of the very old, the very young, and everyone in between. A key driver for this work is the rapidly changing older adult demographics. This program is framed by six topic areas including:

- Public outdoor spaces and buildings;
- Housing and commercial development;
- Transportation and mobility;
- Social inclusion, communication, and participation;
- Civic participation and employment; and
- Community and health services.

Westwood is proud to have achieved Bronze level recognition in 2022, which will be celebrated at the January 12, 2023 regular City Council meeting. The City has already begun working toward Silver level recognition. A task force will meet during the first quarter of this year to assess the impacts City policies and actions are having on the six topic areas named above.
