SOMETHING NEW PROPOSED IN THE HEART OF WESTWOOD

On June 8th, the City Council approved both a purchase agreement with the Shawnee Mission School District for the old Westwood View Elementary School and a separate but related purchase agreement with Karbank for the City-owned property along Rainbow Blvd. between requirements are met during the due diligence period, the new parkland would be the responsibility of the City School by the City will close in January 2024.

The City will lease the building back to the School District through July 2024, which will allow the building to continue to operate as a temporary site for Rushton Elementary and for district staff to clear the building of all


(Something New Proposed in the Heart of Westwood continued from page 1) Karbank is proposing a two-to-four building development along Rainbow Boulevard, primarily for office or limited retail or restaurant purposes.

Throughout the remainder of 2023, the City will be working closely with Karbank Real Estate, elected and appointed officials, and the public to ensure that the development applications and site plans that are submitted align with community desires. It is anticipated that plans will be approved by November 2023, to allow the land purchase agreements to close in January 2024.

We need your input!

The Karbank and City Park proposal is an opportunity for the community to actualize the vision articulated in the 2022 Facilities Assessment and Feasibility Analysis, the 2021 Urban Land Institute Technical Assistance Panel, and the 2017 Comprehensive Plan. It's critical that the specifics of this development are shaped by public input and aligned to community vision and goals.

In the coming months, there are several key steps in the approval process where public input is essential. The public is welcome and encouraged to attend the Planning Commission presentations; the plans presented by Karbank at these meetings will look different than the plans shown in March now that the due diligence period has started post purchase agreement approval.
